Let's Talk ...



Volunteering Auckland has been Super City [lets not call it that for it is far from super - it is a new city

structure - people make a city not structures.] While politicians, councillors and officials have listened to us there is still not enough recognition of volunteers within the structures of the new council and local government.

In forming the New City the existing councils are preparing a register of "in kind" contributions made, the vibrant communities that make up Auckhowever we have yet to see a standardized in depth approach to this. This is good progress in recognising that volunteers and the charitable sector make significant contributions to the economy as well as to the social fabric of the country. At present there is no specific high level process to integrate the volunteer contribution with the corporate asset based system being developed for the New City.

There is much criticism of the loss of democracy in the formation of the New City of Auckland however being able to volunteer is part of the democratic council, but possibly in a different shape and process. To protect volunteering I encourage you to form. become more active and write today to your Member of Parliament and the Prime Minister. Ask that in the legislation for the New City the following be included: "That Volunteers are part of the staffing structure of the new City and the Council, Boards contestable funding and contracts for service and Community Controlled Organizations be required to consider volunteers in their structures and contestable funding rounds, we expect that operations."

Volunteering is a personal contribution to the community - it is your right and responsibility to take democratic action.

> "Community groups are interested - and in some cases concerned – about the impact the new Auckland Council could have on their current relationships with local government, as well as their funding.

> The relationship the new council has with community groups and the interests they represent will be pivotal to the success of the new council, and its ability to contribute to land.

> Until the new Council is formed on 1 November 2010, there will be no change to existing relationships that are mandated by your local council.

> Councils are currently preparing to transition existing organisational relationships and resources through to the new council. While current councils can't provide guarantees, there is no reason to believe that existing relationships won't be maintained by the new

> Councils will be considering the community and not-for-profit groups that have met the terms and conditions of their relationship and will be recommending that both regular nonare extended to 30 June 2012. For annual funding schemes will continue to be available, although there may be changes to application and disbursement dates to ensure a smooth transition to the Auckland Council. After the new council is formed on 1 November 2010 there could be changes to decision making bodies, boundaries, timetables and dates for future funding rounds."

"Water-related" Project



Recently we matched a team from NZI Marine with Sailability as they wanted a "water -related" project.

Due to the weather, the team couldn't polish the boats as intended, however they helped pick up rubbish, swept the yard and washed down the inflatables. The team also had the opportunity to go for a trip around the harbour after completing their project.

Sailability have sailing programmes suitable for almost anyone regardless of the level of their disability or sailing skills. The yachts they use for their programmes have many safety features including weighted centre boards/keels ensuring that the boats are virtually impossible to capsize.

Sailability's mission statement:

"Our aim is to provide people with disabili-

ties the opportunity to sail in safety and to experience adventure and freedom - building mobility, self confidence and pride through achievement"

Here's what **NZI Marine** said about their volunteer day: "**Sailability** is a fantastic operation and we were very lucky to be a part of it for our volunteer day."

A Twist on Team Building



Traditional team building activities have been given a new spin.

This year **Telecom Group Legal and Corporate Services** team thought they'd try something different at their annual off-site event by trying their hand at volunteer work, and it seems to have been a hit.

More than thirty members of the team signed up to help the two local DOC rangers

on Waiheke Island clean up the **Whakanehwa Regional Park** campsite. The crew were responsible for clearing away plant debris and rubbish, helping to reduce the risk of fire, provide more shade areas for campers and make way for winter planting.

"What we were able to achieve in the space of a few hours would have taken the rangers weeks to complete; they were thrilled to have us there," says Angela Dutton, who organised the team.

"On the face of it, cleaning up litter can sound like one of the less appealing types of volunteering, but it was at a gorgeous location and everyone really enjoyed it and felt satisfied by the end of it.

It was a good alternative to traditional team building; we were able to give something back to the community, save money and still be able to do something together.'

Michele Bremser was one of the keen team members to get amongst it.

"It was really fun to be out of the office and doing something different. It was amazing how much we were able to achieve while we were there, I'd be keen to do it again," she says.

Introducing: Kit Howden

I am fortunate to be able to volunteer and use my skills in park

management to help the volunteer sector which needs more support.

On average I put aside approx 2 days a week volunteering on Tuesday mornings. Every Tuesday I am out on the slopes of Maungawhau Mt Eden with 4 to 6 other volunteers undertaking ecological restoration [a fancy name for weeding, cutting privet and other pest plants]. This is the International Year of Biodiversity and our small project is focused on the belief that our care for nature starts in the cities and urban areas where most people now live.

Later in the morning I helped a masters student with her thesis on eco tourism and then had a discussion with the Volunteer Coordinator for Auckland City – he is one of those rare – not yet extinct—on the ground park rangers!
